Councillor Reports

Care Market Strategy

On Tuesday 13 May, Cabinet approved the council's new five-year Care Market Strategy. The strategy sets out how the council will work with care providers in the county and other voluntary and community organisations to ensure there is enough care accommodation and workforce to meet adult social care need. Demand is forecast to keep growing, and providing better support for unpaid carers.

Council Objections to Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects

The Cabinet meeting on 13 May also agreed that the council should object to the proposals for the Sea Link Grid Reinforcement. The council has also objected to the plans for Eco Power's new large solar farm in north Suffolk, based on several factors including the loss of good quality agricultural land, the impact on communities and the local landscape and damage from cable corridors. A statutory consultation on the plans is expected later in the year.

Consultation launched on Developer Contributions

Suffolk County Council has launched a consultation so Suffolk residents can give their views on the contributions which can be sought from developers proposing major planning applications. In 2011, the council published the "Developers Guide to Infrastructure Contributions to make developers aware of what they should consider, and the financial contributions they should make to account to mitigate for the impact of new developments such as housing estates. Developers need to provide

funding to the county council to absorb the impact of extra housing to enable it to provide council services, and the consultation asks for public feedback on how this should be calculated. Council Annual General Meeting

On Thursday 22 May, all three motions tabled were passed by the council, these included a motion against the government's proposed changes to public consultation for Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs) like solar farm applications. The council also agreed motions proposing a ban on live animals being used as prizes on council land, and to support the campaign for Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) to be eligible for the 20 year long service medal which is currently for warranted police officers only.

Local Government Reorganisation - Engagement Meetings

Suffolk County Council is currently arranging meetings with town and parish councils (As the administration's position is that one council would be best for Suffolk, it is likely that they will be promoting this at the meetings.) The one in Woolpit is on 6th June 7.30. County councillors have not been invited to the meetings but as your representatives, we would very much like to be there – if you are attending one of these meetings, please make contact with your local county councillor to find out if they are coming.

Nominations sought for Suffolk Community Awards 2025

Nominations are now open for the Suffolk Community Awards 2025, which is organised by Community Action Suffolk, Suffolk County Council and Suffolk Association of Local Councils. The awards ceremony will showcase the excellent work and achievements of individuals, groups and local councils across Suffolk with 18 awards, including a new one for a local council's efforts respond to climate change. Other award categories cover youth participation and young person of the year,

community building, contribution to volunteering, most active community and council, councillor, young councillor and clerk of the year. Nominations are now open and must be made by Sunday 13 July at www.suffolkcommunityawards.co.uk

River Ratt Catchment - nature recovery

With help I was able to remove the main remaining patch of Himalayan balsam from the council-owned land near Wash Lane, Great Finborough. Information about this invasive species anywhere upstream would be useful, especially from Buxhall or Rattlesden as well as Finborough, including tributary streams. Landowners are encouraged to pull it up when spotted, to benefit the environment and help others downstream.

Locality budget 2025/26

Onehouse Parish Council

June Meeting Summary

The Council reviewed two planning applications with no objections raised.

The Annual Governance Statement and Return for 2024–25 was approved and signed, with a note on the General Reserve.

Payments of £2,265.58 were approved, and total funds stand at £32,787.53.

Two outstanding OHSMag invoices are being followed up.

A £109.35 grant surplus be put towards funding bases for new benches and picnic table.

Updated financial policies were adopted.

A £600 grant was awarded to the Community Centre Committee for building works to finish off the new storage unit area.

Cllr Crissell was elected as representative to SALC. Appointments were also made to the OHSMag working group, and a meeting is planned with a potential new Councillor.

The Council agreed not to pursue further action regarding the Church Walk/Church Way sign complaint. The original Church Walk sign will be removed and preserved due to its connection to a local resident.

Additional dog waste bins have been ordered and are pending delivery. These will be positioned in problem areas for discarded dog waste.

Neighbourhood Plan enquiries are progressing, with £2,000 earmarked for initial costs, information on available grants is pending.

Cllr Copping will meet with Dawn Wnukoski to discuss a Community Emergency Plan.

No comments were made on consultations regarding Licensing Policy, CIL Charging Schedules, or Listed Buildings.

Preparations for the 5th July village fete are well underway and requests for helpers made.

The Paupers Graves area continues to be maintained fortnightly, and paving has been added for the newest bench. A resident has offered a sapling for planting in the area.

The Forest Road to Chilton Leys footpath is progressing with the latest design information promised soon.

Cllr Boulter will contact the Community Policing Team regarding recent issues in Northfield Woods and speeding vehicles through the village.

Plastic is not fantastic! Talking to some of our younger supporters recently, their big concern is plastic pollution. Traces of plastic are everywhere, in soil, up mountains, in our seas, in our bodies. It lasts a very long time - your coffee pod, plastic bottle, man-made textiles and plastic toothbrush may well be around 500 years from now when it will have broken down into pieces too small to see, but causing widespread pollution.

Plastic Free July started as an Australian project and has spread globally – last year 174 million people in more than 190 countries got involved in making small changes that made an overall big difference—you could too:

Take a thoughtful look around your home, school, workplace, or shops and you'll see just how much plastic is around. What changes could you make to cut plastic? For example:

- Say no to plastic brushes in the kitchen and bathroom
- Say no thanks to plastic bags and packaging
- Refill products in plastic bottles instead of buying new
- Consider using plastic nappies only for travel, not for everyday
- Think of alternatives to plastic freebies and giveaways, toys, lanyards, corporate gifts etc.
- Aim to use natural products wood, metal, glass, wool, linen, cotton
- Recycle where you can, but know it is better not to have it in the first place




Preparing your garden for a week away?

Heading off on holiday? A bit of planning will help your garden thrive in your absence. Water everything thoroughly the evening before you go—deep watering encourages strong root growth. Move pots to a shady spot or group them to create a microclimate and help retain moisture. Standing them in trays with water-retaining gel or gravel can also reduce evaporation.

Deadhead flowers to encourage new blooms and harvest anything ripe—courgettes left too long will turn into marrows! Mow the lawn with a moderate cut, leaving clippings if it's hot to help keep moisture in. An automatic timer or a helpful neighbour can make all the difference if it's dry.

A little prep now means you'll return to a garden that's still in great shape, ready to welcome you home.

Nature notes... the Emperor butterfly

As my main interest is in butterflies I will continue that theme from June, outlining some summer stunners.

The star of the show is the Purple Emperor (as seen on the cover), our second largest butterfly.

His Majesty will sit for hours in the top of a prominent oak tree ('King tree') in a deciduous wood only occasionally gliding down to the ground to feed on salts from animal droppings or rotting fruit. You might see males defending their favoured tree top territory or searching for females.

The females are brownish and slightly larger than the males who have a splendid purple iridescence. The purple colouration is the effect of diffracted light rather than a pigment, so a Purple Emperor is in fact black.

A good place to see Emperors is SWT Bradfield Wood or our very own Northfield Wood. You will need a sunny day, a lot of patience and a need to survive a lot of looking upwards, a real pain in the neck! The eggs are laid on Sallow (willow) trees and the hatched caterpillars will hibernate through the winter, then start feeding again the following year, pupating amongst the leaves using their exceptional camouflage.

In July the male butterflies will congregate in their King tree to look out for a mate. If their chosen female has already mated she will perform a 'rejection drop', slowly floating to the ground to show she isn't interested!

Their aim is to ensure that girls leave them with the ability and skills to be independent, and they now have civil rights lawyers, civil servants, teachers, amongst other professionals, who have passed through their doors. They also offer hair and beauty training, as well as tailoring, to girls so that they will have skills to enable them to earn a living.



Conceived as an initiative for the new millennium, the Pickerel Project recently enjoyed its 25th anniversary. Its stated aims include improvement of the Stowmarket river corridor, and enhancement of the natural landscape where wildlife can flourish and people can spend their leisure time. Liaising with other local groups, the Pickerel Project helps to promote the 17-mile Gipping Valley River Path.



Monthly and additional scheduled litter picks, regular invertebrate surveys, river path maintenance and water sampling all fall within the group's current remit. Working closely with Stowmarket Town Council, conservation-related tasks have included tree planting and the creation of backside refuges for small mammals and insects.

The group is part of both Rivercare & Beachcare and the Riverfly Partnership, and it supplies data to both — detailing litter collected to the former, and providing kick sample results to the latter.

In a recent 12-month period (157 volunteer-hours), group members cleared 1,128 cans, 374 plastic bottles, 297 glass bottles. They also

removed a total of 13 shopping trolleys from the town's watercourse, and the general rubbish cleared filled 91 large refuse sacks.



Mark Brewster and Dawn Roberts, both from Onehouse, are active members of the group.

All the cans collected — along with others recovered during interim, ad hoc picks — find their way to Michael Robinson in Harleston for his metal recycling collection which raises funds for Harleston Church.

The group meets on the river path beneath Navigation Approach at 10 a.m. on the first Sunday of the month.

All are welcome, and all equipment is provided,.



Letter from Combs Rectory

It's hard to believe that we're half way through 2025. As I write this letter we've had a week of clear blue skies, sunshine and high temperatures, but the beginning of June was cold and grey. Across the world we're seeing more and more examples of global warming or climate change. As Christians, we're called to care for the environment and here in mid-Suffolk we're doing our best to preserve not only our church buildings but also the green spaces that surround them.

All seven churches in our benefice are surrounded by churchyards which we have the privilege of continuing to care for. To that end it's important to be aware of the detrimental effects of climate change and to do all we can to protect those environments. We have introduced a number of initiatives across the benefice such as a dedicated wild flower area at Harleston to encourage pollinators to visit, and a designated wildlife area at Onehouse which we always leave unmanaged and includes wood piles and areas of bracken to encourage the natural world.

At Shelland bird boxes have been installed and the hedges aren't cut until the birds have finished nesting, we've also planted trees in the church yard. And Little Finborough has been awarded the A Rocha Bronze Eco Church Award because of the progress it has made in becoming more environmentally aware and is now working towards a Silver award. These are just a few of the initiatives we've introduced.

Throughout the year we also have a number of services that celebrate the countryside from Plough Sunday when we celebrate the work of the farming community, to Harvest Festival when we give thanks for the safe gathering in of the harvest. We will continue to maintain our churchyards in the most environmentally friendly ways we can so that all can enjoy their natural beauty.
